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Speed Watch ~ Keeping your roads safe

With the approaching holiday season, the Speed Watch team of volunteers will be out in the Shawnigan/Mill Bay area monitoring speed on our roads in the hope that everyone will arrive safely at their destination. Speed kills! It is the leading cause of death on our roads leaving behind unbelievable trauma, pain and loss. Just think about this: a pedestrian hit at 30km/h has a 90% chance of surviving while a pedestrian hit at 50km/h has an 80% chance of being killed. On a recent questionnaire, 80% of those polled indicated that speeding was their primary concern. Speed Watch was first introduced to the South Cowichan Valley in 1998 by the Shawnigan Lake RCMP detachment in a response to raise road safety and awareness. However, due to local

development, ongoing construction on the Malahat, and more congestion on our roads, the speeding issue has become more critical.

SW Co-Ordinator Bob Wallace, who has been with the program since its early days, describes it as follows, "The Speed Watch van is parked in designated spots in and around Shawnigan Lake, Mill Bay and Cobble Hill. With the use of equipment provided by ICBC and the community policing van, volunteers monitor the speed of vehicles on our roads. A reader board displaying a vehicle's speed is prominently mounted next to a board that indicates the speed limit, allowing the driver to see the variance between the two. Speeders' information, such as license plate number, make and colour of the vehicle, time and place is sent on to the RCMP and ICBC. This is followed

up by a letter from the RCMP. If the same motorist is found to be speeding on other occasions, a notation will appear on his record."

Volunteers have clocked more than 300,000 vehicles from 2002 to the present. The message is clear - residents will not tolerate speeding. As well, the Speed Watch team has been active on other programs such as Seat Belt Watch where it was noted that 20% of those monitored did not wear seat belts. Again, all stats are sent to the RCMP and ICBC. The South Cowichan group also raised \$5,000 for the Be Safe and Be Seen Campaign for elementary school children. Concerned about speeding? We feel that whoever is responsible for the flyer is misguided. It is a perfect way to make people dismiss the "Save Shawnigan Water" effort as an irrelevant group of offensive extremists. This kind of behaviour should be discouraged.

When the votes were finally tallied for the "Sportsplex" funding referendum, the naysayers in the C.V/R.D. were directly proportional to the geographic distance to this facility in Duncan.

Shawnigan, told our elected representatives, albeit marginally, that this is not how we want to spend our tax dollars. In this age of declining funds and offloading at every level of government, when we can't even get a crosswalk in our village core, the holder of the single purse should have a say on how our discretionary tax dollars are to be spent. The supporters and employees of this complex would not be in this quandary if the people had been afforded the opportunity to say they wanted to fund it in the first place.

The purported purpose of this facility is to promote health, fitness, and tourism. Yes, my grandchildren did have their school track meet at the Sportsplex, and yes I was invited to circle the track in support of a worthy cause; but a simple cost/benefit analysis would raise other possibilities for most people.

In Shawnigan Lake, we host the «Subaru Classic Triathlon (now the Ironman)» in which triathletes from around the world come for one day. When these athletes leave, the wilderness trails they used are left in an improved state for all of us to enjoy on a daily basis for the rest of the year. Likewise, the Trans-Canada trail sees international hikers, cyclists, and horseback riders exploring the Kinsol Trestle and environs. Shawnigan Lake and Brentwood schools host annual rowing regattas and have even provided training venues for Olympic Rowing teams.

Handicapped children from all over B.C. have cherished days enjoying the Lake at the Shawnigan Easter Seal Camp every summer.

All this for the cost of CVRD parks staff and bylaw enforcement officers who keep and protect what God has given us in its natural and pristine state.

Were I queen of Shawnigan and could divine the worthy recipients of our public dollars, the Seniors group in the South End or Y.S.A.G.s would be at the top of the list. On any given day the Malahat Legion is a hive of activity with a host of programs run by volunteers, available for the cost of a \$20. membership. Our local seniors are provided exercise, mental stimulation, and companionship, undoubtedly delaying the inevitable cost to our health care system and long term

care facilities. The venue is presently not large enough to house the ever-growing numbers that are discovering this wonderful society.

So while I have nothing against the Sportsplex in Duncan, or the Commonwealth pool in Victoria, or Roger's Arena in Vancouver, I would like to subsidize what is for the greatest good for the greatest number in our community.

The partly new CVRD board is going to act as irresponsibly with taxpayer's money as the previous board

It's already clear that the partly new CVRD board is going to act as irresponsibly with taxpayer's money as the previous board which had a nasty habit of giving away money to third parties with little oversight or realistic assessment of the usefulness of the spending. Virtually all such CVRD giveaways involve a special interest group pleading for more money that they are unwilling to raise themselves from the public. They do this because it's a lot easier to get into the taxpayer's pocket through the weak CVRD board. Most of the time these groups exaggerate their community service and predict that some dire public disaster will occur if they don't get more money.

Under the direction of the new CVRD Chair, who applied for and whose community supposedly benefitted from the increased grant, the board voted to increase the grant to the North Cowichan Community policing by a whopping 24.9% even though the group did not even ask for that much!

The 24.9% increase is really a subversion of the law in that if they gave the group a 25% raise the voters would have to approve this huge grant increase of almost \$25,000 on top of the \$100,000 the group gets now. This group has spent almost \$1 million of taxpayer's money in the past 10 years.

Just about every other volunteer group in the Cowichan Valley raises its own money directly from the public except, of course, the lucky ones that are already in the CVRD trough. But this one gets almost 80% of its funding from the taxpayer and there is a well-paid, full time employee who takes home most of the money provided by taxpayers.

The CVRD should require any special interest group asking for taxpayer's money to fund raise themselves at least 90% of their spending. There is no more acid test of genuine public support than fundraising or a referendum. The better solution is to stop all grants to third parties like most other Regional Districts in the province.

Re: Fran von Alberich's letter (December Focus) regarding the Sunny Daze Campground.

The Sunny Daze Campground sits on F-1 zoned land (forestry). This zoning does not permit the activities (business activities, including camping) that have been occurring on this site for a number of years.

The members of the South Cowichan Advisory Planning Commission visited the site twice (in response to a temporary application permit last spring and rezoning permit application this fall) as part of the process for making informed decisions. Any noted violations that were observed and discussed at the two meetings were a result of these visits, not because of any bias or prejudice.

The job of the commission is to make recommendations based on the merits of the application. The commission members had concerns about compliance related to fire risk, use of riparian areas for camping and violation of noise bylaws. Local residents were concerned with the frequent loud music that went on well past 1 AM.

Ms von Alberich was given a great deal of time to both present her application and answer questions from the commission and members of the public. I suggest Ms von Alberich and others interested refer to the minutes from this meeting for specifics and the questions/responses that occurred. (http://www.cvrd.bc.ca/Archive.aspx?ADID=2369)

It was not mentioned that the weddings and regular "festival events" that have occurred during the spring through fall season, sometimes attracted hundreds of overnight participants to this location, which has 26 camping sites and 12 RV sites.

The Advisory Planning Commission has no "selfish agenda". It exists to "...to advise the Board or a Director of the Board...on all matters referred to it by the Board, or by that Director, respecting land use, the preparation and adoption of an official community plan or a proposed bylaw that may be enacted or issued under this Part." (Section 898 of the Local Government Act)

When I was a child, I watched my mother care for our older relatives, whether they were on her side of the family or my father's. As a nurse, she was invaluable, taking frail French Canadian aunties to doctor's appointments, translating prognoses and protocols, treating them to lunch afterward and giving their apartments a good dusting. She called them, brought them home-cooked meals and made sure they took their medications.

What I've learned from my mother is that caregiving matters. Whether we're caring for a spouse with dementia, a parent who's had a stroke, or an adult child with a disability, our caregiving has a value so great it's difficult to measure, whether personally or economically. Caregiving is full of love, devotion, effort, and patience. When caregivers don't receive the support, information and care they need, it can also be full of frustration, exhaustion, resentment and fear.

I'm proud to be the new Coordinator of the Cowichan Family Caregivers Support Society (CFCSS), as Ranjana Basu, who held the position for many years, has moved on to pursue a doctoral degree. The CFCSS is a non-profit organization that offers

support to those who often put themselves last on the list - caregivers. Through our professionally facilitated support circles, groups, one-on-one support, counselling, advocacy, information, referral and education, we offer care to those who care. We also have a Young Carers Program, to support youth who take on a caregiving role in their families. Our goal is to ease the burden of caregiving so that caregivers can continue to serve their valuable role in our families, our society, and our healthcare system.

Giving, in its entire myriad of forms, from so many people, in the Dwight community along with our local community, is a wonderful thing.




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With your passport, you will visit spots that have been chosen this year to celebrate Shawnigan road names. Have you ever wondered why a road was given its name? This is your chance to find out.

Director's Report - Area B

A cooperative, collaborative community

I spoke about this quite a bit during my campaign, and I have put quite a bit of thought into it since the election. What does a cooperative, collaborative community look like? Why is it important?

In many ways – perhaps in all of the ways that matter the most – Shawnigan already is a cooperative, collaborative community. I saw this at Christmas in the Village, when I watched students from Dwight School work together to put together a street hockey rink supplied by the Shawnigan Lake Business Association. I saw it when I watched people of all ages play in that rink - the bigger people looking out for the smaller people, ensuring that the game was fun for everyone involved.

In our response to the threat

of a contaminated soil site, we have been cooperative and collaborative. The Shawnigan Residents Association secured strong legal representation, and in this effort, the SRA has been supported by the hundreds of people who have donated money – to the tune of more than \$250,000.

Cooperation and collaboration help us realize our goals and make us feel good, but are they essential for the health and well being of our community?

Research in fields from anthropology to psychology demonstrates that cooperation is not only beneficial in our modern world, but it may have been the trait that led to evolutionary success for homo sapiens. Darwin's theory is often associated with the term "survival of the fittest" but "cooperation" appeared far more frequently in his treatises than "competition". According to Darwin, "those communities which included

the greatest number of the most sympathetic members would flourish best...".

It is hard to dispute that the community of Shawnigan has a great abundance of sympathetic members.

At the South Cowichan Volunteer Appreciation Dinner in December, former and current Area Directors gathered with over a hundred people who donate their time, energy, and expertise to their communities. It was humbling to see so many who are so committed to making a difference.

As one former Director pointed out, it is the volunteers who are responsible for so many of the positive accomplishments in our communities. Without the support of so many, we as Area Directors would be much more limited in our ability to create constructive change.

I invite people to come forward help to shape the future of Shawnigan. We have some daunting challenges, including protecting our drinking water and restoring our watershed. We also have exciting opportunities, such as the development of the Elsie Miles property into an inviting park that serves the present and future needs of our community, and the creation of walking and cycling paths that will help make our community healthier and more connected.

After a local contest was held, the name "The Friendship (siiye'yu) Trail" was chosen as the favourite from 45 suggestions. The judges found the name very suitable in connecting with the friendship between the two municipalities.

The trail is ongoing in its creation at the moment but presently it connects downtown Duncan through to the Cowichan Commons. Future plans are in place to eventually connect North Cowichan and the Cowichan Valley Trail, which then will become part of the Trans-Canada Trail network system.

In between the rainy days my 4 legged hiking pal and I headed out on a lovely afternoon to peruse this new trail. We whipped around the traffic circle at the end of Canada Ave (and Sherman Rd) and parked at the end of the residential street by the barricades. Immediately, the forest welcomes you and you almost forget that you are in a bubbling area of business. Around a bend you find yourself on an adorable little bridge and up through to Green Road. The trail more or less runs parallel with the railway track all the way to the Cowichan Commons. I and many others, I'm sure, are thankful for this trail, not only for a pedestrian commute but a nice dip into wilderness. I certainly look forward to seeing how the Friendship Trail evolves and connects the community even more in the future!
