

## Pellet Guns Are NOT Toys!

On Saturday, September 22, 2018, I found my cat just in the distance after he had somehow miraculously dragged himself home. At that time, I had no idea what had happened, but he couldn't move his back legs. It appeared as though he had been hit by a car and had two broken legs.

But when I rushed him to the vet, the prognosis was even worse. I, nor the vet, could believe what we saw upon shockingly viewing the x-rays. We just stared at each other blankly, while the words hauntingly escaped her mouth. "Do you see what I see?" she said with fear in her voice. I said, "Yes, is that a bullet? He's been shot!" I cried out. She nodded with a tear in her eye.

We had to say good bye to our precious Philly that day. Someone felt the liberty to take his precious life, as they paralyzed him with a bullet blow deep within his spine. There was no hope even with surgery. When I reported it to the police, the officer replied, "Well, cats hunt and kill hundreds of birds every year. If someone saw him hunting without a collar, there is a clause in the animal cruelty bylaws that is an exception to cruelty that allows people to shoot at an animal that they believe is wild or stray if they think they are

hunting in the forest". I couldn't believe my ears! When I called the SPCA to verify this, it was ABSOLUTELY FALSE! I was appalled! It just so happens that my little Philly never did hunt birds...mice yes, but I can't remember a day when he brought a dead bird home, ever.

I am writing this article not just out of grief, sorrow and anger, but fear. I am terrified that the authorities are out there giving permission to shoot animals in certain circumstances. If people think they are at liberty to just take a pellet gun and use it whenever they want to on live animals because they have been told so by an officer, they are sorely mistaken. What gives anyone the right to take any life? And now my cat is dead.

I am writing this article in the


hope of raising awareness and creating change to not only the lack of knowledge around animal rights and cruelty laws, but also the lack of compassion in our leadership. It is a cruel world to think that anyone can just intrude on an animal's domain in the outdoors and take their lives at liberty.

Maybe this will wake up our community to think twice about pellet guns and the lack of regulations around them. They should be illegal, as they are not toys to be taken lightly when they have the potential not only to maim, but to kill. Someone desperately needs to tune our authorities in to the animal cruelty bylaws!

In the meantime, my cat is dead. Who will be next?

## Shawnigan Stargazer

#### November: Cassiopeia the Queen and the Milky Way

For November we are going to turn our attention to the Northern sky and identify the easily recognizable W or M shaped constellation of Cassiopeia.

To locate Cassiopeia, find the Big Dipper low on the Northern horizon. Similar to how we found Polaris in the March Stargazer, we will trace a line straight up through the last two stars of the pot of the Big Dipper. This line will go through the North Star, Polaris. Continue along that line toward the Zenith and look slightly to the right. There you will spot the M shape of Cassiopeia.

The brightest star of Cassiopeia is Shedar and is the top left apex of the M. With binocu-

lars you can tell that this star appears more yellow or even slightly pink relative to the surrounding stars. Compare the colour of Shedar to the brilliant blue colour of the middle star of the constellation, Navi. This colour difference is because of the extreme differences in surface temperatures of the two stars. The yellow Shedar burns at a cool 4400°C compared to the blistering 29700°C of Navi. Navi is large star, about 15 times the mass of our Sun. Due to this initial mass, Navi will end its life as a violent supernova, and may even form a black hole when it collapses under its own gravity. Of note, Navi is "Ivan" backwards, and was named by astronaut Gus Grissom, whose middle name was Ivan. The star retained this nickname as a memorial to Grissom after he died in the 1967 Apollo 1 tragedy.

Milky Way: When looking

towards Cassiopeia you may notice a faint bright river of the night sky that flows through the constellation. This is, of course, the Milky Way - the expression of our own galaxy on the night sky. The longer you stay out and your eyes are able to adjust to night, the more prominent the Milky Way will become (it takes about 45

minutes of darkness for your eyes to optimally adjust). Note the Milky Way (plane of our galaxy) runs grossly north to south, compared to the ecliptic (the plane of our solar system; see April Stargazer) which runs grossly east to west. This means that the Earth (and the rest of the planets) are orbiting around the Sun at a very different angle relative to how the Sun is orbit-

ing around the centre of the Milky Way Galaxy.

Planets and Moon: Saturn is all but gone, just hanging on to the southwest horizon at dusk early in the month. Red Mars continues its impressive show and is visible due south at dusk. Venus shines bright to the southeast at dawn. New Moon is November 7, Full Moon is November 23.

## **Book Review**

Have Dog, Will Travel
-A Poet's Journey-

Stephen Kuusisto Published by Simon & Schuster Copyright 2018 by Stephen Kuusisto

This little book was a big hit at my house. When I found Someone quietly wiping his eyes while reading in the other room, I knew I wasn't alone in my feelings for it. Admittedly, it's hard to write about a man and his dog without plucking a few heart strings. But this story doesn't set out to manipulate. Written by poet Stephen Kuusisto, the prose is spare and well-crafted. Certain phrases make one pause and savour - others encourage one to find correlations in one's

own life, and a few to reach for that tissue.

The author, legally blind since birth, was expected to live a full and active life in accordance with his parents' stated expectations. Awkward in his movements and constantly bullied, he continued to try to hide the "shameful" fact that he could barely see. His father was largely emotionally absent and his mother, an alcoholic, made it clear that he was defective and that no one must guess.

Although he describes himself as physical and daring, "Inwardly, my blind soul stayed quiet in its shell". Until Kuusisto was 38, he hid his secret well, somehow surviving to become an English Literature professor at a small college. When he was fired for asking for magnified documents, he became unemployed and floundered.

In his time of despair, he remembered hearing about Guiding Eyes, an organization that paired Seeing Eye Dogs with people who needed them. And thus began the great love story of this book.

After physically training and being closely monitored for gait, temperament and athletic ability, Stephen met his dog - she was an energetic, yellow Labrador.

He describes their first encounter, "Corky burst in like a clown". She flew into his arms, put her paws on his shoulders, licked his face and kissed his nose. The connection was instant. The man learned to give commands, respond to the dog and to look after her. They were both taught to

walk together under the careful guidance of the training team as they navigated busy streets full of traffic, hazards and pedestrians.

For the author, it was freedom. He describes being able to move quickly and without fear, "Sometimes I think it's a bit like swimming. A really long swim when you're buoyant and fast. There's no-one else in the pool."

As Kuusisto describes the widening of his life and the joy of being with his wonderful guide, he tells of the difficult inward journey of accepting himself and of no longer believing that he is flawed or deficient.


He accepts a job with the Guiding Eyes Organization as Alumni Director, travelling extensively as a public speaker with his dog. And then, one day, Corky acts as a match maker and develops an attachment to another dog, Roscoe. The dog is connected to a fellow worker and romance blooms. Soon, our author finds himself a new life with a wife and an extended family. Eventually, he begins to publish his books and becomes a well-known author. His life is rich and full.

Finally, he writes of the time that he must say good-bye to his beloved dog companion. "Corky's spirit was never my sole possession. She wasn't me. She was never mine. She was wisdom's passing gift." And, as we read, we all cry.

Recommended for dog lovers, poetry readers and believers in the power of redemption of the human spirit and, of course, love.

## **Walk Talk**

Mount Work has been on my mind following previous Tod Gowland adventures. But being a Cowichan Valley resident means there are so many wonderful opportunities to explore locally that it is sometimes a challenge to find the gumption and visit other fascinating places on this island. Alas, however, we finally made it a priority and got our butts off to Mount Work.

There are a couple of ways to reach the summit of Mount Work. On this occasion we chose to launch from the trailhead off Willis Point Road which can also connect you to many other splendid gems in the area – Mackenzie Bight, Timberman Trail and the Cascade Trail.

Should you choose a different starting point, please be aware of the trailhead near the

Hartland Landfill. It is beautiful indeed, but is largely catered to mountain bike enthusiasts and can be a tense trail to endeavour.

At our chosen trailhead there is a map. I always recommend taking a photo of this with your phone in the event of a mishap or an unintentional repositioning. Also, on the board is a brief historical introduction and, as it turns out, Mount Work is not really named after the butt work required to get yourself to the top, but partially named after the tough erosion resistant rock (wark gneiss) that makes up part of the mountain. It is so tough, in fact, that it survived a 1000 metre thick glacier carving its way through Finlayson Arm some 15,000 years ago. The mountain is also tribute to Mr. John Wark, a Chief Factor of the Hudson's Bay Company, served on the island's Legislative Council and was also the largest private land owner on Vancouver Island (1386 acres).

We embarked on the Summit Trail, with overflowing enthusiasm, and stayed to the right at the first fork noting the sign that promises a mere 2.9 km to the summit at 449 m. In this case, I would describe the terrain as medium-advanced level - if only due to those 2.9 km that are really and truly upwards. There are periods of switchbacky curves, however, that do make it not entirely grueling and suitable for those medium leveled hikers. Mount Work is a real testament of 'what goes up, must come down' and decent knees are highly beneficial on the decline.

The trail reminded me of our Cowichan Valley trails with healthy amounts of Arbutus and Manzanita trees, along with abundant mosses, lichens and rocky outcroppings.

Need to work that backside? This one will do the trick!

Thank you Area B for your vote of confidence. You spoke loud and clear - I am honoured. I am also excited to have a full 4 year term to work towards our goals. This October, I enjoyed talking with community about our future. We all share a similar vision and the top priorities are:

- ★ Safer roads and a Protected Environment
- ★ A shared vision for a Viable Vibrant Village
- ★ Youth Programming and Community Development

I will continue to bring Economic Development Cowichan and the Village Businesses together to work towards our vision.

In addition, the Community Centre and Area B Parks Commissions and I are all working towards the goal of creating a place for youth and community in the heart of the village. A top priority remains supporting the Shawnigan Research Group as they work with the Ministry of Environment and Sonia Furstenau MLA on removal of the contaminated soil dump.

As I went door to door this fall, a repeated concern was the lack of services compared to our tax dollars. In Area B, the Cowichan Valley Regional

District (CVRD) also acts as our local government since we are not incorporated. The District may not be perfect, but I will be using my experience with the board to help influence better land use decisions, bylaw enforcement and more fiscal responsibility. At the CVRD, Shawnigan Lake has one seat at a table of 15. The system was designed for rural areas and so our needs are not met by this system. For example, we cannot control the speed limits on our roads, in our neighbourhoods, or even create proper drainage at the lowest parts of the village. The Regional District is limited to what and how it can perform services. However,



Incorporated areas have full control of their services and tax dollars. Did you know that Ladysmith residents pay the same in taxes as we do?

They have the same population and have control of their roads, policing, water, and sewer. As budget season is starting, I look forward to many more view points on how we should be supported by local government.

Please join me at my next Director's Meeting on December 3rd to discuss our taxes and anything else you would like to discuss about the role of the Regional District. Most importantly - being Area Director is a huge role and there are many opportunities for community members to help out. Should you wish to explore ways to get involved, big or small...let's connect. Love it! Share it! Protect It!

statement to the one percent".





Frances Kelsey Secondary is offering new and unique outdoor learning opportunities for its students this year. During the first semester, the school is running four classes of a new Search & Rescue and Survival 101 program. Students have the chance to work both in and out of the classroom on topics ranging from wilderness survival, navigation, outdoor careers, animal and environmental awareness. They are working on collaborative problem solving scenarios in an authentic, structured, outdoor classroom environment. They will also be able to receive an extra course credit through the optional involvement in outings aimed at familiarizing them with the many great hiking locations that our area has to offer.

Starting in second semester, the outdoor education focus continues with a new and expanded Streams and Trails program re-branded as «Kelsey Outdoors". Previously, students worked on building trails for the CVRD on Polaris Hill and, this year, hundreds more students from grades 10-12 will be working with five teachers in this dual credit program. During the first half of the term, students will complete either a four-credit Socials 11 or Geography 12 course, followed by a second term in-the-field classroom experience which will count as four physical education credits. During the outdoor portion, students will try their hands at orienteering, trail building, wilderness PE, and general survival skills. So if you think you hear movement in the woods when you are out walking, if it isn't a cougar or bear, it just might be a Kelsey class!


