Introduction:

I retired as an economic development policy analyst with the Province of BC and have a Masters in Environment and Management and a Criminology Diploma. I have deep interests in climate change, ecoforestry, regenerative agriculture, economics, Indigenous rights and title, among others. I was asked by community members to run in this election and, if elected, I am dedicated to earning the trust of Area residents.

What has been your involvement in the Shawnigan Community over the past 5 years?

Protest against the contaminated soil dump, the paving of Taylor Park and the destruction of lakeshore ecology through the Rail Trail project. Mentoring with SL citizens and leaders to learn about issues related to the lake, watershed management, roads, forestry, agriculture, ecology, housing, water and sewer, business concerns.

How do you plan to protect and/or repair the lake watershed, in-



how do you propose to keep our pedestrians safe on the roads?

Community campaign to reduce vehicle speeds and drive with caution. Liaise with RCMP and community policing group to discuss their community plan. Develop good relations with the Ministry of Transportation to address road issues and find solutions. Look at parking options and reduced vehicle traffic on certain roads.

This election has been referred to as a time for change for Shawnigan Lake. What change do you envision?

We are in a climate crisis! We have to get serious about water protection and food security, becoming more self-sufficient. Environmental, cost of living and housing issues require smart planning to provide for future generations and businesses. Development of new funding strategies while acknowledging property owners are not cash cows.

Introduction:

The CVRD a complex organization and the learning curve is a big one. Can we afford to have someone learn it all again when we have so much happening at once: major development pressures, extreme weather events, an affordability crisis and a threat of losing the "Shawnigan in Shawnigan"? With all this in mind, I hope you will put my experience to work.

What has been your involvement in the Shawnigan Community over the past 5 years ?

My community involvement is extensive: everything from volunteering at the schools, community events and of course working hard for the community at the CVRD Board table. Something I am most proud of is the "Love Gratitude Hope" Hearts campaign - during the most stressful time of COVID our small team ran this campaign and raised \$30,000 for Nourish Cowichan.

How do you plan to protect and/or repair the lake watershed, including riparian zones, for future generations?

Having quality water, and enough of it, is a major concern for the community. Currently, the CVRD collects \$750,000 regionally for the Drinking Water and Watershed Protection Plan. I will continue to ensure



Shawnigan Lake remains a CVRD priority. I have also worked hard on the soil bylaw which should help reduce erosion and the amount of sediment being washed into the lake. We funded a campaign to educate lakefront property owners and boaters on how to manage and mitigate the invasive Eurasian Water-Milfoil. We are currently working with the team who replanted 2km of foreshore on Cowichan Lake so they can help us organize and receive grants to replicate their success here at Shawnigan.

Knowing that the province controls our roads, and we have no say, how do you propose to keep our pedestrians safe on the roads?

The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure have limited tools and, unfortunately, we can't have sidewalks... but we can have trails! For this reason, we have been focusing on working towards roadside pathways such as the one in front of Francis Kelsey High School and the sections of rail with Trail between Mason's Beach and Old Mill Park. Ensuring the 100% grant funded Trail along the lake from Government Wharf Park to Old Mill Park is built is

key to getting pedestrians off the roads in the village.

This election has been referred to as a time for change for Shawnigan Lake. What change do you envision?

As a community, we do not envision a lot of change. Slowly we have been implementing small improvements to what we already have such as public right aways (Train tracks land), our community centre, our museum, our parks. Although some people want more "city services" we do not have the population to support it or, in some cases, we are actually not permitted to provide it by the Province. Any change will come forward as development applications and, at that time, I will ensure the community's voice is heard one of the biggest concerns for residents at this time is affordability.

There are many people in our community that work in the forestry industry. How do you plan to work with Mosaic to ensure that forestry remains in a viable relationship?

Forestry is an important part of our community. The wood lots allow us to be surrounded by beautiful forests and trails (that would be in danger of being developed if they were otherwise zoned.) A large part of our community is employed in some way, through forestry, and Mosaic itself spends more than \$5M with local businesses and suppliers (not counting what employees spend and invest.) Furthermore, Mosaic is a large donor to local communities and they are currently working with the community

cluding riparian zones, for future generations?

End the Rail Trail project that will remove 3000 square metres of lakeshore ecology and cut down as many as 100 mature trees. Restore the Shawnigan Basin Society funding for watershed protection. Implement a milfoil control project in Shawnigan Lake. Use gas tax funds to improve not destroy the environment.

Knowing that the province controls our roads, and we have no say, work in the forestry industry. How do you plan to work with Mosaic to ensure that forestry remains in a viable relationship?

Invite Mosaic to become a community partner. Advocate for new forestry jobs: manufacturing; ecological restoration; recreation; camping; education; wildcrafting; biodiversity and wildlife stewardship. Partner with First Nations and Mosaic to sponsor public education, tours and projects.

So, You Don't Vote?

Well at least that what's the numbers say... Almost 7 out of 10 eligible Cowichan Valley citizens did not vote in 2018 according to CIVICINFO BC. This is a statistic that has sadly continued to decline since 2014. Two key outcomes of note: 1) In 2018 the estimated eligible voter turnout for the Cowichan Valley (Regional District), all contested areas combined, was 29.1%. This was 3.3% lower than the average regional district turnout of 32.4%. and 2) Of the 9 Directors elected, 6 are incumbent and 2 are acclaimed. In Area B (where I reside), I believe the numbers were even worse. Out of a population nearing 9,000 people, at the time, we only had 1,403 voters turnout in 2018. How are you not hopping mad that there is this much apathy if you voted and, if you are a non-voter, why don't you vote?

When did we, as a society, let the so-called silent majority become the accepted norm? Why has the majority of our population opted out of democracy? In a world where people are literally fighting to the death to hold on to their sovereignty and democracy, it boggles my mind that we leave the choice of our regional governance and asset management to a small minority of the population.

In Area B, for example, our collective votes only get us one vote at the CVRD board table, but it is still our vote and, more important, it's at least a seat at the table.

My favorite people in the world are volunteers. They show up in every part of our lives, from firefighters to hospitals to social services and fundraising for people in need to name a few. They give freely of their time, effort and sometimes at a great personal sacrifice. But they wouldn't have it any other way. We are down to the final couple weeks to vote in our regional elections. Wouldn't it be amazing, if the majority of us volunteered to vote instead of armchair quarterbacking everything we didn't like that wasn't to our way of thinking. What if we volunteered our time, experience and effort to help make things better instead of not making things better for our democracy.

Cowichan's Largest Book Sale

If you've lived in the Cowichan Valley for some time, you may have heard of, or attended, the Garden House Foundation's charity used book sale held every October at Bonner Elementary School in Mill Bay. If you are a book-loving newcomer, and have not, there is an upcoming treat in store for you at the sale on October 29thth and 30th! Please note that the sale dates have changed from what was published previously.

People often ask what the Garden House Foundation (GHF) is and what happens to the money that is raised at the sale. The GHF is a fund held at the Victoria Foundation (VF), but don't be fooled. Grants given by the fund are targeted only for organizations in the Cowichan Valley.

The VF allows people and groups to establish permanent funds, now valued at \$497 million, to be used for charitable giving. Its operations are monitored by the Canada Revenue Agency. Should anything happen to the VF itself, all funds must be transferred to another community foundation in Canada.

The GHF reaps huge benefits by being associated with the VF. For a small annual fee, legal requirements such as audits are met, annual granting guidelines are established, and fund investments, which on average yield 8 to 10% per year, are overseen.

Profits from the giant 20,000 book sale go into the GHF fund. Annual grants are given to three organizations which provide services to families in crisis and animals in need throughout the Cowichan Valley: Cowichan Family Life, Cowichan Women Against Violence and the Duncan and District S.P.C.A. As the GHF fund grows, so do the grants, and will do so in perpetuity.

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E.J. Hughes at Home in Shawnigan Lake

Author & Artist

Before artist E. J. Hughes and his wife Fern moved to Shawnigan Lake in 1951, Hughes had been a Canadian War Artist. He enlisted on September 1, 1939, just a few days before war was declared, and wasn't demobilized until late September 1946. Thus, among Canadian War Artists Hughes was the first, the last and the most productive.

Following the Great Depression, he despaired of finding employment as an artist. Reflecting on the time he had spent as a cadet with the Seaforth Highlanders in Vancouver, Hughes joined the army as a member of the Royal Canadian Artillery. Though at the time there was no War Art program - it did not become official until 1943 - Hughes began applying for the task and in 1941 was assigned to be one of the first three "Service Artists", along with Orville Fisher and Will Ogilvie. He was sent

to Ottawa to train with the Historical Branch of the army under the historian Colonel A. Fortescue Duguid. Working there for a year, he drew and painted winter scenes at Petawawa and summer on the Connaught Rifle Range.

Arriving in an England shattered by the German "Blitz", in February 1942 Hughes joined different regiments of the Canadian Army which were preparing the defense of England on the south coast along the English Channel. Stationed first at Shoreham and then along the Sussex Downs, he made detailed notes which he developed in his studio in London. In June 1943, at which time he returned to Canada.

Again, based in Ottawa, Hughes was sent to Kiska, an island in the Aleutians of the Alaska coast halfway to Japan. He was the only artist, and though the weather conditions were abominable Hughes found a way to make paint small and develop beautiful

drawings. Back in Ottawa he translated them into powerful oil paintings. Hughes was the "last man out" when the War Artists studio closed in September 1946.

During his service, Hughes created more than 540 drawings and paintings, all army property and now part of the Canadian War Museum's vast collection in Ottawa. With the exception of a few striking canvases this work has never been seen. Now with the full cooperation of the War Museum, plus information gleaned from Hughes's wartime letters with Fern, the story can be told.

The new full-colour book shows Hughes's interest in the military from childhood drawings and cadet training. Endearing cartoons sent to Fern during his training at Fort Macauley provide insight into his personal life. With this in-depth look at his wartime art works, we can better understand



how a quiet fellow from Shawnigan Lake became one of Canada's most respected artists.

Robert Amos is an artist and author. The new book E. J. Hughes: Canadian War Artist (TouchWood Editions, Victoria, 2022. 200 pages, \$35.) is the fourth in his series on the life and work of E.J. Hughes.

We Must Set Aside More Land for Nature

We are over-exploiting our planet: over-producing greenhouse gases and leaving little of the earth for the creatures we share the planet with. This is resulting in a climate crisis and great loss of biodiversity. The increase in mean global temperature and

loss of biodiversity (pollinators) are beginning to affect food production.

> Current forestry practices also impact global warming and loss of biodiversity: our forests used to be net carbon sinks, but no longer. Natural Resources Canada's 'The State of Canada's Forests Annual Report 2021' points out that Canada's Managed Forests have been net carbon emitters since 2002 – see

their figure. The BC Provincial Greenhouse Gas Inventory shows that BC forests have also been net carbon emitters since 2002 with the amount of carbon being emitted ranging from 40 Megatonnes (MT) of carbon dioxide-equivalents annually to 204 MT annually. These forest emissions do not form part of the official statistics, neither for Canada (~740 MT) nor for BC (~69 MT). We need to advocate for better forestry practices, and setting aside more of our land for nature. A few years ago, we had the opportunity to purchase 830 hectares of mature second growth forest surrounding Grant Lake. These lands are contiguous to the 230-hectare Koksilah River Provincial Park. We could have had 1060 hectares of contiguous protected land, a small step towards promoting biodiversity and healthy forests in the Cowichan Valley. If the CVRD was willing to contribute a modest down-payment, the Shawnigan Basin Society and the Cowichan Land Trust were willing to fundraise the remainder.

Although there were Directors in favour of acquiring these lands, the CVRD Parks & Trails Acquisition Fund was not made available.

It is time to reinstate a Parks Commission (not Committee) so the public has a say in the acquisition of parks and trails.

Affordability in Shawnigan Lake

The secret is out on how great our community is. Young families and retirees are moving to our area and many who grew up here are returning (if they ever left.) We are struggling to keep "the Shawnigan in Shawnigan" and provide for those who want to remain in Shawnigan Lake without getting priced out. At the local level we have limited ability but that hasn't stopped me from

doing and supporting what I can.

Recently, I brought a motion to the board for the CVRD to work with Island Health to understand the size/density restrictions on lots in the village. Specifically, could we safely add more suites and carriage houses in the village area, since we currently have public water but no sewer yet? This would allow individual homeowners to quickly build some more affordable rental units and supplement their income.

If re-elected, you can be assured that I will be asking about and supporting adding extra housing where we already live. This reduces urban sprawl and increases the number of affordable units, while supporting current residents. Improving affordability allows more people to live in their hometown close to their family and support networks.

I am also currently in conversation with Cowichan Housing to help bring a seniors housing project to Shawnigan Lake. Area B has \$50,000 in trust to support non-profit groups in getting a project off the ground. This is an all hands on deck kind of crisis and if you have any comments please reach out.

We want your submissions to create Artistic Bicycle Racks for the Shawnigan Lake Waterfront Trail

The Shawnigan Residents Association (SRA) has received funding from the Island Coastal Economic Trust Fund to create four seating and bike rack areas at viewpoints along the waterfront trail between Mason's Beach and Government Wharf Park. Our vision is to create something a little unique and creative along our waterfront. We envision the bicycle racks as public art pieces representative of the character of Shawnigan, combining form, function, and local craftsmanship.

Each location will be a spot

to rest and offer views to the lakefront, or to allow cyclists to lock their bikes and access beach swimming areas or take a short walk to the Village to visit local shops and cafes.

The initial concept of the seating portals came out of the Design Charette held in 2019 to revitalize the Shawnigan Village community. The process was lengthy and invited all residents and stakeholders to participate. It resulted in the Shawnigan Village Plan, a community-based locally specific development plan. Although CVRD has been working to implement portions of the Plan, community initiatives were delayed due to Covid. We are

pleased to finally be able to engage in community projects envisioned in the Shawnigan Village Plan.

This is a great opportunity for a local artist, metal worker, blacksmith or other craftsperson within the Cowichan Valley or environs to showcase their creativity. Concept submissions will be received up to November 15, 2022. The work will be promoted throughout media channels by the SRA and CVRD.

This scope of work includes the design, materials and fabrication of four artistic metal bicycle racks for a budget of \$10,000.
