Driving in School Zones

All Drivers, this one's for You!

 Speed Limit is 30km/ hour – 8AM - 5PM in all School Zones Every School Day.

School Bus Laws:

1. Drivers Must Stop!
Our provincial driving manual teaches that one must stop when you approach a school bus displaying flashing red lights from the front or the rear, no matter what lane you are in. You



must not start moving again until the bus driver signals it is safe by turning off the lights and pulling in the stop sign. This would cover any direction.

2. Drivers must exercise proper precautions

when encountering a child on any road, street or highway.

Speed Watch Volunteers Wanted

As a member of the community, you may be asking how you can participate in community-based programs that make this a safer place to live for us and our children. Speed Watch is a program staffed entirely by community volunteers. "Volunteers are the Heart of Community Policing"

Trained volunteers, working in pairs, arrive in our Community Policing van, and use radar with a large electronic display. E. J. Hughes

Robert AmosAuthor and Artist

In 1951, artist E. J. Hughes and his wife Fern moved to Shawnigan Lake and, except for Fern's radio, things became very quiet. It was like that until 1977, when Hughes, then a widower, moved to Duncan. Photos show that his living room centred on his record player and his collection of LP records, exclusively big-band jazz of the 1940s. "Ed needs to be with people his own age to find anyone else who gives much of a damn about the forties," Pat Salmon wrote in her diary. "He sees no music worth appreciating after that, except Fraser MacPherson's playing (mostly of 40s music). If I ever dared to tell him I liked modern music it might be curtains to our friendship." Pat Salmon's diary, January 10, 1995

According to Salmon, Fraser MacPherson was "the one person in his whole life that I have ever seen Hughes chase. It's because of his superb talent. MacPherson is as good at what he does as Hughes is. One time I saw that Fraser MacPherson was going to

be performing at a school in Duncan, so I said to Hughes "would you like to go see him?" And without much enthusiasm he said "alright... if you want."

"That night we were almost the only people there, besides the students, and Hughes was just utterly taken with MacPherson. He went right up to the stage and stood behind the guy. And that was Hughes' reaction. Fraser MacPherson had no idea who Hughes was at that point. Later, his sister Jane (who was a nun) told him who Hughes was.

"Another time we went to see MacPherson play at the University of Victoria for some biggish event. And from the stage at one point MacPherson said "I'm going to dedicate this to my friend E. J. Hughes." And he didn't even know Hughes was in the audience!" Pat Salmon to Robert Amos. Personal communication 2012.

Though Hughes avoided travel, in 1984, he accompanied his sister Irma and Pat Salmon on a trip to Washington, New York and Montreal, paid for by his dealer, Max Stern. On his return, on November



19,1984, Hughes wrote to Stern: "At last I can sit down and write this "thank you" letter for making that wonderful 11-day trip possible for Irma and Pat and myself... New York was a veritable mad house of honking taxis, but our hotel (NY Hilton) was comfortable and luxurious, as were the two restaurants. Twice we visited one of the lounges, where there was a live jazz piano player

in action, producing very exciting music, so good that I congratulated him and said "you are Teddy Wilson's only rival!"

In his later years, Pat and Hughes were often out and about in the Cowichan Valley, looking for painting sites and places to dine. At that time, the cafés of Duncan provided him with all music he needed. As recorded in Pat Salmon's diary: "Wednesday, February 14, 2001: Had dinner with Ed at Jake's and it was really quite nice. I admire Jake's as they give space for artists and, also, bring in live music. Ed liked the guitarist so much that he gave him a twenty dollar bill. For Ed that was incredibly generous, but he is very high right now as his two paintings sold for good prices at Winchester."

It's Impossible to Hide

Someone asked me the other day how I feel knowing the history that I know and living in this modern world. At first, I didn't know what to say. I think I kinda laughed it off. I answered casually that it comes and goes in waves. One minute, I'll be splashing with my kids in the river laughing and playing. Then I'll see something that brings me back, like a dying cedar tree or a pool of salmon fry cut off from the main river. These things are obvious and probably make most people acknowledge their changing environment and think almost existentially.

But what really breaks my brain are moments like last night. I went to the skatepark with the kids and we had a blast. But every time I looked up, I could see Swuq'us staring down at me. I am reminded that where I am skating was the edge of the once great S'amuna Xatsa and that my not-so-distant ancestors would have travelled where I now skated. Then my brain zooms out and I can't help but see the highway, the cars, the stores, the unhoused people, and the garbage. It goes from zero to a hundred.

All of a sudden, my kids notice that I've stopped skating and ask me what's going on. I tell them I am tired and resting, not wanting to spoil their fun. But I stand there, bearing witness on behalf of my blood ancestors. I see the lake reduced to a warm, nearly toxic puddle. I see a highway running over a once prolific Salmon bearing creek. I see people going hungry begging for food in a place where generations of hunters caught ducks by the thousands. I see a great

and powerful empire reduced to POW camps we call Indian Reserves. Then I look back at my kids and I can't help but wonder, with everything I've taught them, what they will see when they are adults?

In that moment, and only for a brief second, I see why some elders stopped teaching. It hurts. It's like a genetic trauma. When we live in the place of our ancestors and are raised with their stories of abundance and power, it can be difficult to look around and see what's taken its place. I see why some of the wisest elders and relatives struggle with their mental health.

Residential schools and Indian hospitals may be closed, but colonization never stopped. Along with the earth we never forget who we are...we've just been buried in colonization and it's impossible to hide from.

It makes me so happy to say that I have had no instances this summer where I felt at risk, no times when I have been honked at (except in greeting) or felt crowded. Now, what do we do about the Department of Highways?
