The Great Fire of 1930

Shawnigan Lake Museum

As often happens in a small community, events are locally chronicled as being "before" or "after" some momentous or disastrous happening.

Shawnigan's disaster happened shortly after noon on April 2nd, 1930, when fire destroyed the whole of the commercial village on the waterfront. The SLAA Hall and Library, McLaren's Store, the Post Office, the McLaren building and barn, and the water tank along the tracks were destroyed.

"Men from the Shawnigan Lake Mill, the neighbourhood stores and boys from Lonsdale's school fought the fire. They were handicapped, however, by the lack of water supply and the presence of a high wind." Losses were estimated at \$40,000 (\$750,000 today). In November ,1930, the court heard from numerous victims of the fire in a special hearing at Shawnigan Lake. Margret Clay, Victoria Public Library Librarian testified to the value of the lost books. A. H. Killan of the Provincial Library testified that the Shawnigan Lake Library had been kept in better shape than most libraries in the province.

Justice W A Macdonald found the E&N Railway Company liable for the loss because of negligence in starting the fire on the right-ofway under dry climatic conditions at the time (there had been no rain for over a week at the time)

Almost a year after the court trial, on October 10,1931, the new community hall opened with grand ceremony.

The new hall, erected by the Shawnigan Lake Athletic Association

to replace the one destroyed by fire was officially opened Saturday evening. C. H. Dickie, federal member for the district, performed the ceremony and accompanying him was Mrs. Dickie, who was presented with a bouquet of flowers by the ladies of the committee.

After making a tour of the building, Mr. and Mrs. Dickie were escorted to the stage in company with S. J. Heald, president; F. T. Elford, vice-president; Mrs. F. T. Elford, Mrs. A. I. Dyson and Mrs. F. M. Gannon. The president introduced Mr. Dickie to the 250 assembled guests.

In a happy little speech Mr. Dickie recalled the many pleasing events that had taken place in the old hall. He complimented the directors for their unselfish work and stated that in his opinion the new hall was second to none on the Island. It was admirably planned, well-constructed, and was a standing monument to what could be accomplished with united effort. He urged the district to rally around the management



took place to music supplied by a five-piece orchestra. The hall was equipped with every modern convenience, for the time, and was a third larger than the old hall. H. E. Hawking and F. T. Elford acted as Masters of Ceremonies. The supper and arrangements were in the hands of Mrs. A. Kingsley and a group of Shawnigan ladies. They transformed the diningroom into a bower of autumn foliage and flowers and served a dainty supper. Those attending came from all parts of the district as well as Victoria.

The 1931 Community Hall continued to be the heart of the community for decades. It was sold around 1990 to help pay for the new Shawnigan Lake Community Centre, in Elsie Miles Park. It was sold again in 2015 by the CVRD as part of the Elsie Miles Park expansion. The building was torn down in 2015.

August began with a continuation of July's dry, warm weather. At mid-month, a notso-usual thunder & lightening storm ushered in cooler, wetter fall-like weather for the subsequent 10 days.

During this period, the temperature struggled to reach 20° on a number of days. The 26th was the wettest day with totals ranging from 15 mm in the village to close to 25 mm in the typically wetter area near Cigarmaker's Bay. Overall, 9 days of rain was a bit more than average.

Until the mid-month cooling, daily mean temperatures were near the top three rankings for the past 110 years. A late month hot spell bumped up the temps a bit and August ended up in the top 20 for temps.

Five days had temperatures of 30° or greater, and 18 days had more than 25° . Six days were less than 20° . 11 days were full sun, 6 days with partly cloudy skies and 14 days with cloudy conditions. The 28th was a particularly cool night, with temps in the single digits.

The sunset times in August were noticeably earlier which is normal for the waning summer months. Sunset on August 1st was 8:51 pm. On the 31st it was 7:57 pm, almost an hour earlier. The shorter daylight hours will continue as daylight dimishes by $3\frac{1}{2}$ minutes daily through September

Lake levels are a bit higher than normal for this time of year and the water temperature is close to normal. Usually the water temp hangs on close to 20° until mid-Septmber. In 2020 it made it until the first week of October.





Did You Know?



Prior to 1964 there was no mechanism for controlling the lake level. Very dry summers saw very low levels; unusually wet winters saw correspondingly high levels which would sometimes cause logs and debris to block the outlet.

In the early 1980's the Ministry of Environment (MoE) imposed stipulations on the three water license holders requiring the construction of a new weir in order to maintain minimum lake flows during the summer months.

In 1983, the MoE, with input from the community and various stakeholders, established a "rule curve" which stated target lake levels to provide storage and prevent flooding. This specifies a gradually declining level for the period of March 15th to October 1st. Specifically, the level should diminish from 116.3m to 115.75m, which corresponds to a decreased water volume from 800 litres per second to 375 litres per second.



The new weir enables easy adjustment of a metal gate to control water levels, determining the frequency and degree of correction, but it is not an easy process.

It is a balancing act which is dependent on rainfall and evaporation. A frequent comment heard during high lake level events is that the weir should be lowered further. This is not possible from November to March when the weir is fully open (assuming the rule curve is being followed).



The Board of the Cowichan Valley Regional District (CVRD) proposes to adopt:

- CVRD Bylaw No. 4566 Shawnigan Village Water System Service Establishment Bylaw, 2024; and
- CVRD Bylaw No. 4567 –
 Shawnigan Village Water System Loan Authorization (\$3,200,000) Bylaw, 2024.

Bylaw Summary:

If adopted, these bylaws will:

- Establish a Water System Service Area within a portion of Electoral Area B Shawnigan Lake; and
- Authorize borrowing up to \$3,200,000 to purchase the Shawnigan Village Waterworks system.

The estimated annual cost to residential property owners within the proposed service area would be approximately \$1,300 per parcel per annum until the debt is retired.

The CVRD may adopt these bylaws unless at least 10% of electors within the proposed service area request a referendum by submitting a signed Elector Response Form by **4:30 p.m. on Monday, September 23, 2024.**

If you approve of this proposal, you do not have to do anything. If you object to the proposal, eligible voters within the proposed service area may sign the form. Elector Response Forms are available at CVRD Offices, online, and at South Cowichan regional recreation centres.

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

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E.J. Hughes Paints Genoa Bay

On February 24, 2023, fire destroyed the old Captain Morgan's Lodge, built in 1885, the oldest building in Genoa Bay. Fortunately, artist E. J. Hughes had carefully documented this building, and village around it, in paintings some years earlier.

In a letter to his Montreal dealer Max Stern, on March 28, 1981, Hughes described the subject: "On the east coast of Vancouver Island, three miles from here (Duncan, B. C.) are the small settlements of Maple Bay and Bird's Eye Cove, and a short distance from the latter, by gravel road, is the still smaller settlement of Genoa Bay. The view in the above painting is the only one of the bay obtainable from the road, and the thanks for that is due to someone who has been keeping the saplings cleared."

In the Hughes files at the University of Victoria is the original frame label for Hughes's first oil painting of the subject, Genoa Bay, Near Duncan B.C. (1975). "On the point of land just behind the boats on the left is a long horizontal sign, and on the other side of the sign, facing the open sea are the words, "Genoa Bay Marina & Café". The café and store are in the building at the top of the ramp from the float. The old houses on top of the hill were probably built years before when there was a large sawmill on this site, about 1900. They are still occupied."

Genoa Bay is a particularly pretty little cove. At the lower edge of Hughes's painting, beyond the cut-down saplings tossed across the foreground, gentle ripples in the harbour reflect a fishing boat with a tender, a trimaran and a patrol boat ready to head out. The wharves lead to a ramp and shop with a verandah, a pre-fab building and a phone booth. There's a parking lot and three old houses, one standing on the point behind a large arbutus, looking out to sea. Out in the water, buoys mark the entrance to the cove. A sailboat tacks in toward Genoa Bay, and a speed boat is heading out and away toward Salt Spring Island. The sense of freedom is palpable.

Upon receiving this canvas on June 4, 1981, Stern wrote: "I have just returned from a 35day trip to Europe in which I was in five different countries and visited my artist friends, named Henry Moore, Georges Mathieu, Emilio Greco, Pericle Fazzini, Giacomo Manzu, among others. On my return, I was delighted to find your new painting in our Gallery. It is, in my opinion, one of the finest paintings you have ever painted, and the subject matter is ideal for our gallery. I can only congratulate you on the mastery you have attained." Fifteen years later, on January 19, 1996, Hughes and his assistant, Mrs. Pat Salmon, took my wife Sarah and I out for lunch at Maple Bay. Later that afternoon we drove through the new subdivision which was creeping up the hillside across from Genoa Bay. Hughes was keen to show us the houses that Pat's husband Martin had built, in his business as a contractor, as well as his own painting spots (all with convenient parking).



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
